I get paid in the middle and end of each month, but my bills are due at different times. Can you help?

In your situation, I rec-

ommend using a two-column approach when you sit down each month to create your written budget. In it, one column would represent the first of the month, while the other represents the fifteenth. Place the income you'll receive for each pay period at the top of each column, then work your way down spending every dollar on paper for that pay period, until all the money








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
